## 2. Important Legal Cases

- **Shafin Jahan v. Asokan K.M. (2018):**

This decision reinforced the importance of personal liberty and individual autonomy, principles that also underpin arguments in favour of same-sex marriage rights.

- **Legal Challenges:**

- *Baby Gammy Case* (India-related context, 2014):

- **Facts:** An Australian couple entered into a commercial surrogacy arrangement in Thailand. The surrogate mother gave birth to twins—one of whom was diagnosed with Down syndrome. The couple took custody of the healthy child but left the child with Down syndrome behind

- **Significance:** This case raised ethical concerns about the commercialization of surrogacy and the exploitation of surrogate mothers. The Indian government subsequently issued a ban on commercial surrogacy.

○ *Janani v. Union of India* (2017):

- **Facts:** A petition was filed in the Supreme Court of India challenging the ban on commercial surrogacy.
- **Decision:** The Supreme Court upheld the ban on commercial surrogacy but allowed altruistic surrogacy for Indian couples who meet certain criteria.
- **Significance:** This decision established a framework for altruistic surrogacy in India, allowing couples to seek help from family members or friends to have children. Ethical considerations: Ethical concerns arise regarding issues such as exploitation of surrogate mothers, commercialization of reproduction, and the rights of children born through these technologies. Questions about the well-being of surrogate mothers, the rights of intended parents, and the best interests of the child must be carefully considered.
