It also highlights the need for comprehensive efforts to address the root causes of gender-based violence, challenge ingrained societal attitudes, and promote gender equality and respect for women's rights across all spheres of life. Recognizing the historical context of gender-based violence is essential for developing effective strategies to combat it and foster societies where all individuals can live free from violence and discrimination based on their gender.

Since the 1970s, women have been actively involved in the movement to defend human rights, but their gender-related demands have not always been prioritized within this broader struggle. It wasn't until the late 1980s that women began to fully recognize themselves as individuals with legal identities, prompting them to challenge the essentialist view of social hierarchies and the normalization of their subordination.

During this period, women became increasingly aware of their rights as citizens and started advocating for new ways to exercise their citizenship on an equal footing. They questioned the prevailing notion that their subordination was "normal" and demanded recognition of their status as equal members of society. This shift in consciousness led to a realization that the most fundamental right is the "right to have rights," as articulated by political theorist Claude Lefort in 1987.

Linking the issue of gender-based violence with human rights provided women with new avenues for analysis and advocacy in their struggle to end discrimination. By framing gender-based violence as a violation of human rights, women were able to challenge the systemic inequalities and injustices that perpetuated such violence. This approach also highlighted the interconnectedness of various forms of discrimination and underscored the need for comprehensive solutions that addressed the root causes of gender-based violence.

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Gender-based violence within the home encompasses a range of behaviors that may not always be immediately recognized as acts of violence but nonetheless have serious implications for the well-being and safety of individuals. These behaviors include verbal and emotional aggression, deprivation of liberty, coercion, inflicting physical injuries that may not be severe enough to constitute serious bodily harm, and sexual abuse that falls short of rape or ravishment.

The United Nations group of experts on violence against women has emphasized the importance of considering the concept of "victimization" in understanding the real needs of victims and providing them with appropriate protection. Traditionally, the concept of violence has been associated with extreme cases involving severe injury or femicide. However, by recognizing victimization as a broader concept, legislation can better address the diverse forms of violence experienced by individuals within the home.

A comparative analysis of legal proposals in various regions reveals two distinct models for addressing gender-based violence within the home. The first model considers mistreatment as a symptom of conflict, implying that interventions should focus on resolving underlying conflicts within relationships. The second model views mistreatment as a crime, emphasizing the need for legal sanctions and accountability for perpetrators.

These two models are associated with different procedural approaches, with some proposals prioritizing conflict resolution and others focusing on criminal justice responses. Understanding these differences is crucial for developing comprehensive legal frameworks that effectively address gender-based violence within the home while taking into account the diverse needs and experiences of victims. By considering victimization as a central concept and exploring various approaches to addressing gender-based violence, policymakers can work towards developing

legislation that provides meaningful protection and support for victims while holding perpetrators accountable for their actions.

The police force is widely recognized as playing a crucial role in addressing violence within families, both in terms of prevention and assistance. It is considered a cornerstone of a country's social response to this issue, given its unique combination of coercive power and accessibility. In many countries, the police force is the only institution available 24 hours a day and provides comprehensive geographical coverage, making it the primary point of contact for individuals experiencing gender-based violence.

However, data collected globally indicate that the police response to victims of gender-based violence is often unsatisfactory and may even contribute to secondary victimization. Secondary victimization refers to the re-traumatization or exacerbation of harm experienced by victims as a result of their interactions with the criminal justice system or service providers.

In response to these challenges, efforts have been undertaken in various regions to improve police responses to gender-based violence. One such initiative involves establishing specialized units within the police force specifically dedicated to addressing gender-based violence. These female police units, also known as women's police stations or gender-based violence units, are staffed by officers trained to handle cases of gender-based violence sensitively and effectively.

Additionally, efforts have been made to provide training and instruction to police officers of both sexes on how to respond to gender-based violence in a manner that is survivor-centered, trauma-informed, and respectful of victims' rights. This training aims to equip police officers with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary to provide effective support and assistance to victims while holding perpetrators accountable for their actions.

The establishment of all-women police forces, comprising police officers, detectives, and social workers, marks a significant development in addressing gender-based violence and providing support to victims. São Paulo pioneered this approach in 1985, with the inauguration of the first all-women force. Within its first year of operation, the force responded to 200 calls, highlighting the demand for such services. By 1988, a single unit received a staggering 7,000 calls, underscoring the widespread need for specialized support in addressing gender-based violence.

Inspired by this model, other countries in the region followed suit. By 1992, state governments in Brazil had established 240 such units, demonstrating the expansion and recognition of the importance of specialized units in addressing gender-based violence. Similarly, by 1993, Colombia had established 70 family police units dedicated to promoting negotiations and interventions to address violence within families.

In Ecuador, significant steps were taken in 1994 with the approval of the establishment of female police forces in four major cities: Quito, Guayaquil, Cuenca, and Portoviejo. Women's organizations actively engaged in information and training activities to ensure these police units effectively defended victims of gender-based violence.

The existence of these specialized institutions has led to improved care for victims of gender-based violence. Moreover, the systematic collection and analysis of statistical data have enabled the identification of groups of women most severely affected and the various manifestations of gender-based violence across the region. This data-driven approach enhances understanding and informs targeted interventions to address the diverse needs of victims and combat gender-based violence effectively.

Prompt reporting and effective legal procedures are essential components in addressing and preventing gender-based violence. A study conducted by the legal team of the Centre for the Treatment of Domestic Violence in Santiago, Chile, highlighted the significant impact of these measures in combating aggression within intimate relationships.

The study revealed that in 72.5% of cases, aggressors who received a summons from police or legal authorities, or who became aware that they were under investigation, ceased their acts of violence. This cessation was attributed to the aggressors' realization that they would face consequences for their actions and would no longer go unpunished. However, it is important to note that in 5% of cases, aggressors responded by escalating their violence, demonstrating the complexity of responses to legal interventions.

Additionally, the study found that in 22.5% of cases, the reaction of the aggressor could not be ascertained due to factors such as women withdrawing their charges or the early stages of legal proceedings. This underscores the importance of providing support and resources to victims to ensure their safety and empowerment throughout the legal process.

Gender-based violence extends beyond the physical acts of aggression and includes the institutional barriers and systemic biases that perpetuate what has been termed "secondary victimization." This term, coined by Viano in 1987, refers to the additional harm and trauma experienced by victims when seeking help from authorities or support services. Unfortunately, many women face hostility, negligence, or discrimination from officials responsible for providing assistance, further exacerbating their distress.

In many cases, victims are met with skepticism, blame, and doubt regarding their accounts of violence. The severity of the aggression may be downplayed, with excuses made based on factors such as the perpetrator's drunkenness or allegations of adultery. Furthermore, resistance to recent

legal changes aimed at addressing gender-based violence adds to the challenges faced by victims seeking justice and support.

To address these institutional hurdles and redefine the role of public officials in preventing and responding to gender-based violence, several countries in the region have initiated programs to train and raise awareness among personnel working within the justice system. These programs aim to sensitize officials to the complexities of gender-based violence, dispel myths and misconceptions, and ensure that victims are treated with dignity, respect, and empathy.

By addressing institutional biases and providing training and support to justice system personnel, countries in the region are taking important steps towards creating a more supportive and responsive environment for victims of gender-based violence. However, ongoing efforts are needed to ensure that all individuals working within the justice system are equipped to effectively address the needs of victims and uphold their rights in accordance with international standards and legal reforms.

Services that offer support to abused women play a crucial role in gathering valuable data on the prevalence and characteristics of gender-based violence. These services possess firsthand information that provides insights into the extent of the problem and recurrence rates, offering a deeper understanding of the dynamics of gender-based violence.

For instance, data from the Family Violence Prevention and Assistance Programme in Buenos Aires sheds light on the scale of the issue. The program receives approximately 600 calls each month, with 66% of these calls being requests for care and information, and 40% requiring emergency assistance. Notably, women between the ages of 25 and 54 account for 97.4% of the relevant population group affected by gender-based violence, indicating that this issue significantly impacts women during their most productive years.

Moreover, the data reveals that the majority (85.5%) of calls for assistance are made by the victims themselves, highlighting their initiative in seeking help. In contrast, only a small percentage (9.1%) of calls come from relatives, and an even smaller percentage (5.4%) are from other members of the community, such as neighbors. This indicates that while third parties may be aware of instances of abuse, they are less likely to intervene or take action to prevent or report it.

These statistics underscore the importance of support services in providing a lifeline for victims of gender-based violence and highlight the need for greater community awareness and engagement to address this pervasive issue effectively. Additionally, data collected by such services are invaluable for informing policy and intervention strategies aimed at preventing and responding to gender-based violence and ensuring the safety and well-being of survivors.

Gender-based violence within households not only inflicts harm on individual women but also has broader social, economic, and political implications for society as a whole. By denying women the ability to exercise their fundamental rights, such violence perpetuates and reinforces a system of discrimination and subordination that affects more than half the population. This systemic oppression constitutes a clear violation of human rights and undermines the principles of equality and justice.

Furthermore, gender-based violence reflects the absence of a socio-political structure characterized by equitable and symmetric social relations. In societies where such violence persists, there is a lack of genuine equality and respect for human dignity, hindering the consolidation of democracy. Gender-based violence acts as a barrier to the realization of democratic ideals, as it undermines the principles of freedom, equality, and human rights upon which democratic societies are built.

Moreover, the presence of gender-based violence directly or indirectly obstructs the harmonious development of nations. It creates an environment of fear, insecurity, and inequality, which hinders social progress and impedes the full participation of women in economic, political, and social spheres. Addressing gender-based violence is thus not only a matter of human rights but also a prerequisite for achieving sustainable development and fostering inclusive and equitable societies.

Gender-based violence within households has severe consequences for children who are exposed to such habitual violence. The impact extends beyond the immediate victims, affecting the emotional, psychological, and developmental well-being of the children in these environments. Abused women often report that their children exhibit signs of nervousness, irritability, and fear as a result of living in an environment marked by violence. These children may also experience academic difficulties, and sadly, some become direct victims of physical abuse either by the father or, in some cases, by the abused women themselves.

In contemporary understanding, children who witness violence in their homes are now recognized as "battered children." This acknowledgment stems from the recognition that these children display similar psychological symptoms as those who are the direct targets of abuse. The trauma experienced by witnessing violence can have long-lasting effects on their mental and emotional well-being, shaping their attitudes and behaviors in significant ways.

An additional factor to consider is the emotional and affective dependence that children have on their parents. Children often model their roles and behaviors based on what they observe in their family environment. Consequently, they may encounter challenges in establishing healthy and non-violent emotional relationships later in life, as they tend to replicate the patterns they

witnessed during their formative years.

Tragically, children raised in households marked by gender-based violence may grow up to become violent individuals themselves, contributing to a cycle of violence. Boys in such households may internalize violent behavior as a norm, while girls may be at an increased risk of becoming victims of violence in their adult lives. Moreover, these individuals may develop a greater tolerance for various forms of social and political violence, perpetuating a cycle that extends beyond the confines of the family unit.

Addressing gender-based violence is not only crucial for the immediate victims but also for breaking the cycle of violence that can affect the next generation. Interventions and support systems are essential to mitigate the impact on children, providing them with the resources and tools needed to break free from the cycle and contribute to building a society free from violence and abuse.

Some countries have taken steps to address the urgent needs of abused women and their children by establishing shelters where they can seek refuge from violence. These shelters provide a safe haven for women who have no support from family members or lack the financial means to leave an abusive environment. By offering a temporary place to stay, these shelters enable women to escape the immediate danger of violence and begin the process of rebuilding their lives.

One such example is Refuge House, a shelter for abused women and children located in Quito. This shelter was established through a collaborative effort between the Ministry of Social Welfare, represented by the National Women's Department, and the Ecuadorian Centre for Women's Advancement and Action (CEPAM). Over a period of 29 months from 1991 to 1993, Refuge House provided shelter to 245 women who had experienced domestic violence at the hands of their spouses. Additionally, the center offered counseling services to another 120 individuals who did not reside at the shelter, highlighting the critical role such facilities play in supporting survivors of gender-based violence.

The existence of shelters like Refuge House serves as a lifeline for abused women and their children, offering them a safe space where they can access essential support services and begin the journey towards healing and empowerment. These shelters not only provide immediate protection but also offer comprehensive assistance, including counseling, legal support, and access to resources to help survivors transition to independent and violence-free lives.

However, it is essential to recognize that shelters alone are not enough to address the complex issue of gender-based violence. Comprehensive strategies that encompass prevention, intervention, and support are needed to effectively combat violence against women and create a society where all individuals can live free from fear and abuse. This requires a multi-sectoral

approach involving government agencies, civil society organizations, and communities working together to address the root causes of gender-based violence and ensure that survivors receive the support and resources they need to rebuild their lives.

Ideological and cultural factors play a significant role in how women perceive and respond to gender-based violence within the household. In many cases, such violence is normalized and accepted as a part of marital relationships, perpetuated by societal biases against intervening in the privacy of married and family life. As a result, women often internalize social values that reinforce female subordination and may feel pressure to maintain harmful relationships due to various cultural and social norms.

One key factor contributing to women's tolerance of abusive relationships is the internalization of social values that portray female subordination as "natural." Throughout history, patriarchal norms have enforced the idea that women are inherently inferior to men, leading to the normalization of gender-based violence as a means of maintaining control and dominance within relationships.

Additionally, cultural norms that regulate the roles of spouses and mothers further reinforce the acceptance of gender-based violence. Traditional gender roles dictate specific behaviors and expectations for women, often portraying their primary role as caretakers and subservient partners to their husbands. As a result, women may feel compelled to endure abuse in order to fulfill societal expectations of marriage and family life.

Furthermore, the idealization of the family and marriage as central pillars of society can contribute to women staying in abusive relationships. Society often promotes the notion of the nuclear family as an idealized unit, placing pressure on individuals to prioritize the preservation of marriage and family unity above their own well-being.

Lastly, women may face social pressure to accept dominant cultural mandates that normalize gender-based violence. This pressure can come from various sources, including family members, religious institutions, and broader societal attitudes that perpetuate harmful stereotypes about gender roles and relationships.

The statistics provided by doctors in free emergency wards in Santiago, Chile, reveal a concerning reality regarding the prevalence of gender-based violence and the barriers that prevent victims from seeking help or reporting incidents to the authorities. According to their estimates, only around 20% of cases involving physical injuries from violence are treated in these emergency wards. This suggests that a significant portion of victims choose not to seek medical attention or disclose their experiences, often opting to remain in their homes until the visible marks of the aggression fade away.

Furthermore, the data indicates that only 15% of women who receive medical treatment for injuries resulting from violence report the incidents to the police. This low reporting rate highlights the reluctance or fear that many victims experience when it comes to engaging with law enforcement or seeking justice for the violence they have endured. This reluctance may be fueled by various factors, including fear of retaliation, societal stigma, lack of trust in the justice system, or a belief that reporting will not lead to meaningful intervention or protection.

Additionally, the mention of cases where women respond violently to aggression, resulting in mutual violence, sheds light on the complex dynamics of gender-based violence within relationships. It underscores the fact that victims of abuse may resort to defensive measures to protect themselves from ongoing aggression, sometimes resulting in fatal outcomes. The mention of women committing murder in response to constant aggression from their partners highlights the extreme circumstances and potential consequences of prolonged exposure to violence within intimate relationships.

Overall, these statistics and observations underscore the urgent need for comprehensive efforts to address gender-based violence, including raising awareness, providing accessible support services, strengthening legal protections, and fostering a culture of accountability for perpetrators. It is essential to create safe avenues for victims to seek help and support, while also addressing the root causes and societal attitudes that perpetuate violence and hinder victims' ability to seek assistance and justice.
